LET'S CONGRATULATE OUR LEARNERS

Feuerstein Graduates

" I learnt more in the course than in all my time at school" says one graduate of the 20 week Feuerstein Course held at the Chrome Collective.

9 students graduated the Level 1 & 2 courses with 9 further students due to start the level 2 course in September.

Course tutor, Jude Robinson of PCTI, watched students grow in confidence and increase their ability to think. They also experienced reduction in anxiety, better attitudes, trying new things, socialisation, and increased communication skills. Jude says "the main highlight for me is the pure joy it brings when students master activities that go from relatively simple to more complex. Another highlight for me is the love that is shared as a group as the course progresses". It a course that also gives back to the tutor; one man who doesn't speak wrote on his evaluation. "I Lov you."

The lessons extended outside the classroom. One lesson was about attitude and two ladies went home and made posters looking up all the words for a better attitude and feeling good about themselves and pasted them on their walls. Support person Margette Campbell who brought Waihi's Cool Crew to every single session was also presented with a certificate in appreciation of her efforts.

We're hopeful for funding to take students to level 3 in the future. Jude says with the training-to-date she was able to identify 4 students who would be able to be in paid employed given the opportunity.
